

WHEREAS, it is necessary that a contract by and between THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, herein called the STATE and the MUNICIPALITY be executed for such STATE aid; now therefore be it

RESOLVED:

1. That the filing of an application in the form required by the State of New York in conformity with the applicable laws of the State of New York including all understanding and assurances contained in said application is hereby authorized.
2. That Robert Henke, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors is directed and authorized as the official representative of the MUNICIPALITY to act in connection with the application, to sign the resulting contract if said application is approved by the STATE; and to provide such additional information as may be required.
3. That the MUNICIPALITY agrees that it will fund the entire cost of said household hazardous waste program and will be reimbursed by the State for share of such costs as indicated in the contract.
4. That two (2) certified copies of the resolution be prepared and sent to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation together with a complete application.
5. That this resolution shall take effect immediately.

BUDGET IMPACT STATEMENT: Reimbursement grant from the State. Costs determined by amount and type of waste collected.

Chairwoman Fedler called the meeting to order at 10:00 A.M.

A motion to accept the minutes of the October 30, 2018 meeting was moved by Mr. Shaw, seconded by Mr. Middleton and adopted.

SEWER DISTRICT: Joe Brilling, Executive Director, addressed the following items with the committee:

- Budget Amendment – Requesting a budget amendment to carry forward into the 2018 budget unspent Environmental Planning grant funds from 2017 in the amount of \$3,700.00. A motion to amend budget to recognize unspent 2017 grant funds in the amount of \$3,700 and forward to the Finance Committee for consideration was moved by Mr. Skellie, seconded by Mr. Middleton and adopted.
- Discuss Sewer District #1 MOA with Kingsbury – After many years, they are finally moving forward with an agreement with the Town of Kingsbury to maintain the sewers and pump stations not owned by the district. They have a draft memorandum of agreement but still have a few billing type questions and would like to meet with the County Attorney and County Treasurer to discuss that and then present a final agreement to the committee for consideration. The town is not set up to do the maintenance; they do not have the staff but the Sewer District does. There will be some kind of charge assessed to those users in addition to what they are already paying to cover those costs. This needs to be done to keep them in compliance and helps Sewer District No. 2. This agreement will need approval by the Board of Commissioners and the County Board.
- RFQ 2018-32 Award – This RFQ is for the next phase of the long-term control plan. Interviewing two respondents' tomorrow afternoon in the classroom from 3PM to 5PM. He

would like to award this RFQ as soon as possible. The respondents will be interviewed and the Sewer District Board of Commissioners will forward a recommendation to the County. The recommendation will be forwarded to the Finance Committee and consideration given to move to the full Board for approval. He welcomed anyone interested to attend.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS – Deborah Donohue, Superintendent of Public Works, addressed the following items with the committee:

- Project Updates:
  - Bid Awards:
    - CR 113 went out to bid and the low bidder was Kubricky \$4,096,434.85. There is no local share for construction or construction inspection. A motion to award bid for CR 113 to Kubricky in the amount of \$4,096,434.85 was moved by Mr. Shaw and seconded by Mr. Middleton. Discussion. Mr. Shaw asked if the lighting issue has been resolved. There is money in contingency and it is likely lighting will be included but first need to get into the rock to determine if feasible. This is a Marchiselli funded project and the Treasurer stated we will have to watch the cash flow because this funding is slow coming back in and the County does not have \$4M to float. The Treasurer stated the General Fund is the lowest he has seen it in a long time. Possibly BAN and have available if needed and that BAN process would start after the first of the year. The motion to award bid for CR 113 to Kubricky in the amount of \$4,096,434.85 was moved by Mr. Shaw, seconded by Mr. Middleton and adopted.
    - CR75/40 – Recommending awarding to low bidder, Peckham Construction, in the amount of \$791,139. This is also a Marchiselli funded project and the outlay of cash. This is a spring construction project. A motion to accept low bidder for CR 75/40, Peckham Construction, in the amount of \$791,139 was moved by Mr. Hicks, seconded by Mr. Middleton and adopted.
    - Putnam fuel system bids – Yesterday, the Putnam fuel system bids were opened but there is a code question that needs clarification. Consideration of the Putnam fuel system bid was referred to the Finance Committee for consideration.
    - CR 10 – Requesting authorization to sign supplemental #3 that adds additional funding to cover the cost of construction, construction inspection, and increased funding for design and right-of-way on the CR 10 project. A motion to forward resolution authorizing Chairman to sign Supplemental #3 CR 10 project was moved by Mr. Middleton, seconded by Mr. Rozell and adopted.
  - Discuss Dump Stickers – The department has four hundred twenty-five thousand, 425,000, unused dump stickers and requesting to move forward with disposal. A motion to incinerate remaining dump stickers was moved by Mr. Rozell, seconded by Mr. Skellie and adopted.
  - Shop Updates:
    - Truck Bids – Regarding plow truck bids for next year and the fact that the County is not going to try to keep them as long any more, the Superintendent asked if they should be bid with steel or stainless-steel bodies. The cost to upgrade to stainless steel is approximately \$8500 per truck. The resale value with a stainless-steel body should be higher. Looking to purchase four trucks. There has been discussion going on that stainless steel is not good for summer work with rocks and stuff so maybe half and half; two steel and two stainless steel. How long we are keeping trucks is a discussion for the January Public Works Committee meeting; Superintendent stated roughly seven years. Suggested to research what we have and how they are holding up. Discussion on half and half or all stainless. Recommendation is to go to with all stainless steel. These bids cannot be awarded until January. The Treasurer asked if this authorizes the

Budget Officer to sign equipment request and make this part of the Machinery Fund spending plan. Questions on the bid specifications because we have experienced problems with our current trucks. The County Administrator stated before the bids go out, the specification can come to Finance. Possibly piggy back off another County's bid, Onondaga. These are big-ticket issues and have had issues with some of the International trucks. The County for standardization could pass a resolution selecting a specific brand of truck. We would need documentable evidence that our International trucks had systemic issues. The Superintendent will send the Supervisors the bid specifications and Supervisors can communicate with the Superintendent if they have any concerns. Committee approved authorizing the Budget Officer to sign equipment request and make this part of the Machinery Fund spending plan.

- Cutting Edges – Two more are needed for the new trucks that are going into service in early January. Last year two trucks damaged a piece of the three-piece cutting edge and need replacement. Requesting to purchase two new 11ft. blades and one new 12 ft. blade. A motion to approve purchase of cutting edges, truck snow blades, was moved by Mr. Rozell, seconded by Mr. Shaw and adopted. If towns are interested, they have carbine blades available for sale.
- B&G Truck Cap – Buildings and Grounds has a van and usually when they replace an ADRC/NEWCO van one is given to Buildings and Grounds because they need a covered compartment. They have not replaced any ADRC/NEWCO vans in two years and there are no vans available to replace the aging Buildings and Grounds van. The Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds is requesting to purchase a truck cap. A motion to approve purchase of truck cap for Buildings and Grounds was moved by Mr. Middleton, seconded by Mr. Rozell and adopted.
- Miscellaneous:
  - Snow & Ice Agreement with Warren County – Same amount and terms as last year. A motion authorizing Snow and Ice agreement with Warren County was moved by Mr. Hicks, seconded by Mr. Rozell and adopted.
  - Local Law – Solid Waste Hauler Permits – The Superintendent asked if we want to continue to require solid waste hauler permits – haul solid waste within the County. Do we want to continue to issue permits? The County is no longer in the solid waste business. Budgeted revenue in the amount of \$3500 and received only \$220. A motion to set public hearing to repeal solid waste hauler local law was moved by Mr. Hicks, seconded by Mr. Shaw and adopted.
  - The County received a Watershed Coalition Grant out of the Regional Planning Board that was never accepted for three different stormwater mitigation projects. A motion to accept Watershed Coalition grant in the amount of \$17,400 and forward to the Finance Committee for consideration was moved by Mr. Skellie, seconded by Mr. Rozell and adopted.

WHEREAS, pursuant to State Environmental Quality Review Act (hereinafter “SEQR”) a “Short Environmental Assessment form” has been prepared for the Local Law dated November 15, 2019, which describes the action (hereinafter the “EAF”), and

WHEREAS, the EAF, having been reviewed by the Board, was deemed completed and accurate relative to the Local Law, and

WHEREAS, the Board determined that the Local Law constitutes an Unlisted Action as defined by the SEQR regulations §617.2 (ak) and did not identify any interested or involved agencies, therefore resulting in no notifications and no coordinated review pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.6(b)(3), and

WHEREAS, the Board, by resolution dated November 15, 2019 declared itself Lead Agency with respect to the Local Law in accordance with the SEQR regulations at 6 NYCRR 617.6, and

WHEREAS, the Local Law was the subject of discussion at a public meeting held on October 29, 2019 and was also the topic of discussion during the Board meeting on November 15, 2019 when the Board introduced the Local Law and set the public hearing; further discussions on this local law took place in committee on December 12, 2019, and

WHEREAS, the Board publicized the public hearing regarding the adoption of the Local Law and received no written comments relating to adoption of the Local Law, and

WHEREAS, the Board caused to be completed Part II of the EAF, which was reviewed by all Board members and discussed at the public hearing on December 20, 2019, and

WHEREAS, the Board has undertaken its very best efforts to identify all areas of potential environmental concern, has thoroughly analyzed and considered each potential environmental concern, taking into account the magnitude and importance of each, and now makes its Determination of Significance with respect to the Local Law in accordance with the SEQR regulations at 6NYCRR §617.7; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that:

1. The Board hereby accepts the answers set forth in Part II of the EAF.

2. Based upon a thorough examination and analysis of the EAF and review of the SEQRA regulations at 6 NYCRR §617.7 and based further on comments received from members of the public and the Applicant, the Boards' knowledge of the area surrounding the Local Law and such further investigation of the Local Law and its environmental effects as the Board has deemed appropriate, the Board has considered reasonably related long-term, short-term, direct, indirect and cumulative impacts and has identified the following relevant areas of environmental concern and makes the following findings with respect to the Local Law:

a. The Local Law will not cause a substantial adverse change in existing air quality, ground or surface water quality or quantity, traffic or noise levels; a substantial increase in solid waste production or erosion, potential for flooding, or drainage problems. The adoption of this Local Law will not result in any change in the environment of the immediate area or neighborhood with respect to any air or water quality issues with the exception that it is designed to improve those very issues;

b. There will be no impact to any threatened or endangered species and the Local Law does not include the removal or destruction of large quantities of vegetation. The Local Law will not impact residential/mixed use neighborhoods that have already been developed and any critical or agricultural areas surrounding or in any proximity to be effected by the Local Law will not be harmed in any manner by the passage of this Local Law. This law will not impact individuals in the County other than those who are engaged in the business of hauling waste;

c. The Local Law will not impact the characteristics of any critical environmental area pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.14(g);

d. This Local Law is not a material conflict with the current goals or plans as officially approved or adopted in the County.

e. The Local Law will not impair the character or quality of any historical, archeological, architectural or aesthetic resources of an existing community. The Local Law will in no way effect the look, character or function of the neighborhood, and obviously will have no impact on neighborhood character;

f. The Local Law will not result in a change in either the quantity or type of energy used;

g. The Local Law has no capacity to create a danger to human health and is in fact implemented to assist in the protection of human health;

h. The Local Law will not result in a change to the existing open space of the community and will have no impact on the capacity of the area to support existing uses;

i. The Local Law will not encourage or attract large numbers of people to the area, compared to the number of people who would come to the place absent the Local Law. The Local Law in no way resembles an attraction of any sort;

j. The Local Law has no foreseeable impact not detailed above that would result in any of the above consequences;

k. The Local Law will not result in any changes to the environment that, when viewed together, would create a substantial adverse impact to the environment. This Local Law is adopted pursuant to a regulation by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation that requires municipalities create a solid waste plan. Without adoption of this law the County may not have adequate information to create such a plan, therefore adoption will create a benefit to the environment and public health. Upon careful review of the EAF, information submitted by the applicant and other comments from the community and the regulating authority of NYSDEC, it is declared that the Local Law does not contain components that, if combined, would be a substantial impact. There is no potential for significant environmental impacts resulting from the Local Law; and

l. The Local Law is not one of two or more related actions undertaken, funded or approved by the agency;

3. Based on the foregoing investigation of the potential environmental impacts of the Local Law and after carefully considering the setting, the public comments, probability of occurrence, duration, irreversibility, geographic scope, magnitude and number of people affected by each environmental impact therein indicated, the Board makes the following findings and determination with respect to this Local Law:

a. The Local Law constitutes an “Unlisted” action as said quoted term is defined in the SEQR regulations at 6 NYCRR §617.4;

b. The Local Law will not result in any large and important environmental impacts and, therefore, is one that will not have a significant impact on the environment. Therefore, the Board hereby determines that the Local Law will not have a significant effect on the environment, and the Board will not require the preparation of an “Environmental Impact Statement” with respect to the Local Law; and

c. As a consequence of the foregoing, the Board has determined to prepare a “Negative Declaration” with respect to the Local Law.

4. The Chairperson of the Board is hereby directed to file a “Negative Declaration” with respect to the Local Law consistent with this resolution, in the office of the Board and to provide a copy of the “Negative Declaration” to any person who requests a copy, and to publish notice of same in the statewide Environmental Notice Bulletin.

5. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

LOCAL LAW NO. 3 OF 1992  
COUNTY OF WASHINGTON, NEW YORK  
Introduced by Mr. Esiason

A LOCAL LAW REQUIRING THE SOURCE SEPARATION  
AND SEGREGATION OF RECYCLABLE OR REUSABLE  
MATERIALS FROM THE SOLID WASTE STREAM  
IN WASHINGTON COUNTY

BE IT ENACTED, by the Washington County Board of Supervisors as follows:

SECTION I. GENERAL STATEMENT

1. Declaration of Policy

The policy of this Local Law is to require the source separation and segregation of recyclable or reusable materials from solid waste and to require that solid waste which has been left for collection or which is delivered by the generator of such solid waste to a solid waste management facility shall be separated into recyclable, reusable or other components for which economic markets for alternative uses exist.

2. Definitions.

a. "Solid Waste" - all materials or substances discarded or rejected as being spent, useless, worthless, or in excess to the owners at the time of such discard or rejection.

b. "Collector" - any individual, association, partnership, firm or corporation in the business of collecting solid waste, other than their own solid waste, within Washington County.

c. "Contractor" - any individual, association, partnership, firm or corporation in any business dealing with construction or collection of junk; and any individual, association, partnership, firm or corporation which owns a packer truck and is not a collector.

d. "Individual Hauler" - any person that hauls with a car, van or pickup truck, his own solid waste.

e. "Sanitary Landfill" - a facility which includes types of operations in which solid waste is deposited by plan on a specified portion of open land, is compacted by force applied by mechanical equipment, and then is covered by a layer of earth, all in accordance with or intended to be in accordance with Part 360 of the New York State Environmental Conservation Law.

f. "Transfer Station" - a facility where solid waste is transferred by a collector, contractor or individual hauler, to a container for transport to a sanitary landfill, recycling facility or resource recovery facility, material market or construction and debris landfill.

g. "Resource Recovery Facility" - any facility defined in Section 27-0701 (2) of the Environmental Conservation Law.

h. "Recyclables" - those materials designated by this Local Law and/or by order of the Washington County Superintendent of Public Works as recyclable, reusable or other components for which economic markets exist for alternative uses.

i. "Components" - paper, glass, metals, plastics, garden and yard waste and such other items as may be designated by the Superintendent.

j. "County" - County of Washington

k. "Superintendent" - the Washington County Superintendent of Public Works.

## SECTION II. ADMINISTRATION

1. The Washington County Superintendent of Public Works, with the concurrence of the Solid Waste Committee of the Board of Supervisors, is hereby authorized to and shall promulgate, amend and repeal rules and regulations in furtherance of this Local Law and shall enforce the provisions of this Local Law and the rules and regulations authorized by this Local Law.

2. The Superintendent of Public Works shall administer the provisions of this Local Law and the rules and regulations in furtherance thereof.

## SECTION III. SOURCE SEPARATION REQUIRED

a. Effective September 1, 1992, source separation and segregation of recyclable or reusable materials from solid waste shall be required by every person and business generating such waste in Washington County.

b. Solid waste which has been left for collection or which is delivered by the generator of such wastes to a solid waste management facility, shall be separated into recyclable, reusable or other components as described and directed by the rules and regulations promulgated by the Superintendent.

c. The County of Washington shall be responsible for the operation of five recycling/solid waste transfer stations, located in the Towns of Jackson, Greenwich, Granville, Whitehall and Kingsbury.

**A LOCAL LAW ESTABLISHING WASTE/RECYCLABLE MATERIAL HAULER LICENSING, VEHICLE IDENTIFICATION, AND HAULER REPORTING REQUIREMENTS**

**BE IT ENACTED**, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Washington, New York, as follows:

SECTION 1. Title.

This Local Law shall be known as the Local Law Establishing Reporting Requirements for Assistance in for Recycling and Solid Waste Management.

SECTION 2. Purpose.

The purpose of this Local Law is to provide for the health safety and general welfare of the residents of Washington County by establishing a mechanism by which reliable and complete information can be obtained to assist County Officials in their continuing efforts to assess, understand and resolve difficulties currently confronting the County with regard to unacceptably high solid waste disposal costs and recycling program shortcomings. While the County is currently undertaking certain steps to control solid waste disposal costs and address recycling program deficiencies, it is anticipated that this Local Law will provide valuable insight as to the flow of solid waste and recyclables in and out of the County which in turn will allow County Officials to improve recycling programs, and provide information that may lead to the discovery of other approaches or reconsideration of known approaches that could ultimately further the goal of controlling and perhaps further minimizing solid waste disposal costs for residents of the County.

SECTION 3. Applicability.

The provisions of this Local Law shall apply to any hauler of residential and/or commercial solid waste and/or recyclable material that is generated or originated within the boundaries of the County of Washington for disposal, storage, transfer and/or processing.

SECTION 4. Definitions.

County - means the County of Washington.

Hauler - means any person who, for a fee or other consideration, collects, transports, transfers or delivers solid waste and/or recyclables that is generated or originated within the County of Washington for disposal, storage, transfer and/or

processing.

Hauler-Container - means any receptacle provided by a Hauler for the deposit of solid waste and/or recyclables. Such receptacles shall include but not be limited to front, side and rear load dumpsters, compactors, refuse cubicles, roll offs, shop box, open containers, garbage cans, and barrels.

Hauling Business - refers to the activities of haulers for a fee or other consideration as set forth in the definition of "Hauler".

Licensee - means any person holding a license issued pursuant to this Local Law.

Person - means any individual, public or private corporation, political subdivision, government agency, authority, department or bureau of the State, municipality, industry, partnership, association, firm, trust, estate or any other legal entity whatsoever. The masculine gender shall include the feminine, and the singular shall include the plural, where indicated by context.

Recycling Facility - (recyclables handling and recovery facility) means a solid waste processing facility, other than collection and transfer vehicles, at which nonputrescible recyclables are separated from the solid waste stream or at which previously separated nonputrescible recyclables are processed.

Recyclables - means solid waste that exhibits the potential to be used repeatedly.

Solid Waste - Solid waste means, any garbage, refuse, sludge from a wastewater treatment plant, water supply treatment plant, or air pollution control facility and other discarded materials including solid, liquid, semi-solid, or contained gaseous material, resulting from industrial, commercial, mining and agricultural operations, and from community activities, but does not include solid or dissolved materials in domestic sewage, or solid or dissolved materials in irrigation return flows or industrial discharges that are point sources subject to permit under 33 USC 1342, or source, special nuclear or by-product material as defined by the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, except as may be provided by existing agreements between the State of New York and the government of the United States. This definition shall not include any scrap or other material of value separated from the waste stream and held for purposes of materials recycling.

Superintendent - means the Washington County Superintendent of the Department of Public Works.

#### SECTION 5. License and Identification Requirements.

A. License Required. No person shall engage in or conduct a hauling business in the County of Washington unless licensed in accordance with the provisions of section 6 hereof.

B. Identification Decals Required. It shall be unlawful for any person to allow or permit a vehicle to be used or filled with solid waste and/or recyclables within Washington County without a county issued decal affixed thereon and without the Hauler's name and phone number appearing thereon.

SECTION 6. License Application/Procedures/Fees.

A. License Application Information. The application for a license under this Local Law shall be filed by the person engaged in a hauling business subject to the provisions of this Local Law with the Superintendent using a form to be prepared under the direction of the Superintendent and approved by majority vote of the Washington County Board of Supervisors Public Works Committee. The application shall contain or set forth:

- i. Name and address of the applicant; if an individual, the name under which he/she intends to do business; if a co-partnership, the name and residence address of each member thereof and the name under which the business is to be conducted; if a corporation, the name of the corporation and the name and residence address of each of the officers.
- ii. The place or places, including the complete address or addresses of the applicant's business office address, warehouse sites, buildings, sites, and/or sites where trucks and/or hauler-containers are stored and any other business site where the applicant plans to conduct business activities relating to the hauling of solid waste and/or recyclable materials generated or originating within Washington County.
- iii. Description of each motor vehicle and/or trailer used or planned to be used to haul solid waste and/or recyclable materials, which description shall include the following:
  - a. Year, make and model;
  - b. License plate number and state of registration;
  - c. Gross and tare vehicle weight;
  - d. The volumetric capacity in cubic yards of the motor vehicle and/or trailer;
  - e. Color of the vehicle and/or trailer; and
  - f. Name of owner and residence of the motor vehicle and/or trailer.
- iv. A certification that the applicant has in effect and shall maintain during the term of the license, liability insurance covering the vehicles and operators thereof subject to the licensing provisions hereof.
- v. A certification sworn and certified under penalty of criminal prosecution reading as follows :

THE UNDERSIGNED CERTIFIES UNDER PENALTY OF CRIMINAL PROSECUTION THAT THE INFORMATION PROVIDED AND/OR DISCLOSED IN THIS APPLICATION IS COMPLETE AND ACCURATE AS OF THE DATE THIS APPLICATION IS EXECUTED TO THE BEST OF THE UNDERSIGNED'S KNOWLEDGE AND BELIEF AND HAS BEEN PREPARED BASED ON A DILIGENT SEARCH OF ALL BUSINESS AND OTHER RECORDS IN THE POSSESSION AND CONTROL OF THE APPLICANT. THE UNDERSIGNED FURTHER CERTIFIES THAT HE/SHE HAS AUTHORITY OR HAS BEEN DULY AUTHORIZED TO COMPLETE THIS APPLICATION ON BEHALF OF THE APPLICANT.

- B. License Term/Duration. A license issued pursuant to this Local Law shall be for a two (2) year term unless revoked or surrendered earlier. There shall be no apportionment or pro rata fee adjustments regardless of the length of the term of the license or whether the same is revoked or surrendered.
- C. License Application Update/Corrections/Reporting Requirements. The Superintendent must be notified within thirty (30) days of any changes in the information set forth or contained in the application filed with the Superintendent. A Licensee or Registrant shall inform the Superintendent of:
- i. any other material change in the information submitted on the application for the license or registration; or
  - ii. any change in the ownership composition of the Licensee, the addition or deletion of any Principal at any time subsequent to the issuance of the license; or
  - iii. a Licensee shall have a continuing duty to immediately disclose and/or update the information provided to the Superintendent in its application annually, on the anniversary date of the issuance or renewal of the license or registration.
- D. Licenses nontransferable. If a Licensee sells or transfers its hauling business or vehicle and/or container, the license or permit for said hauling business or said vehicle or container is void at the moment of sale or transfer and the licensee if the hauling business is sold, must surrender the license held for it to the Superintendent within ten (10) days or if a vehicle(s) or container(s) is sold or transferred, the Licensee must remove the County decal issued for said vehicle(s) or container(s).
- E. License Fees. The fee for the license required by this Local Law shall be set by Resolution of the Washington County Board of Supervisors.

SECTION 7. License - Standards for Issuance.

A. Upon the receipt of a sufficient application for hauler's license, together with the fee required hereunder, the Superintendent shall a) make a record of such application; b) assign a distinctive number to such hauler commencing with legend "WC Hauler Number"; and c) issue a sufficient quantity permit decals for the hauler to place on all trucks and trailers used by the hauler in Washington County.

B. An application for a license shall be deemed insufficient by the Superintendent if any information required on the application has not been furnished.

C. Denial of license – upon denial by the Superintendent of a license, applicant may appeal to the Superintendent to review the determination. Upon further denial, applicant will be deemed to have exhausted administrative remedies.

SECTION 8. Reporting Requirements.

A. On forms to be prepared under the direction of the Superintendent and approved by majority vote of the Washington County Board of Supervisors Public Works Committee, after issuance of a license pursuant to this Local Law, the Licensee shall, unless exempted by subparagraph D hereof, provide written quarterly reports to the Superintendent, providing the following information:

- i. In cubic yards or tons, as specified on the Superintendent's reporting forms, the total quantity of Solid Waste and Recyclables collected during the reported quarter according to the type or class of account; the total quantity of materials that were processed, recycled, disposed of or delivered to a recycling facility during the reported quarter, the quantities of Recyclables that are delivered to each facility that transfers, stores, collects or processes Recyclables; the quantities of such Recyclables that could not be recycled or marketed but were disposed of as Solid Waste during the reported quarter; the total quantity of construction and demolition debris collected and the quantities that were recycled or delivered to a recycling facility or Recyclables broker during the reported quarter. The phrase "type or class of account" as used herein shall not be deemed to require disclosure of the name or identity of a particular customer but rather is intended to refer to a generic description, e.g. residential, industrial, commercial, etc. With the particular account type or class designations to be developed by the Superintendent in consultation with the Washington County Board of Supervisors Public Works Committee.
- ii. The place and location where solid waste and/or recyclables were disposed of including the name or identity and address of the disposal facility.
- iii. Any subcontracting of any portion of the Licensee's business, shall,

for reporting purposes, be treated as though done by Licensee itself.

B. Quarterly reports referred to in subparagraph A hereof shall be furnished for activity occurring during the following periods: January 1<sup>st</sup> - March 31<sup>st</sup>; April 1<sup>st</sup> - June 30<sup>th</sup>; July 1<sup>st</sup> - September 30<sup>th</sup>; and October 1<sup>st</sup> - December 31<sup>st</sup>. Quarterly reports shall be delivered and/or mailed to the Superintendent or designee not later than thirty (30) days following the end of the quarter.

#### SECTION 9. Inspections/Audits.

A. Vehicles used in the collection or transportation of solid wastes within the County shall be subject to reasonable inspection by the County or its agents for purposes of determining compliance with the terms of licenses and this Local Law and for the purposes of data collection. Failure to allow inspection shall be a violation of this Local Law.

B. All solid waste generated within the County and set at a designated **public** area for collection by a hauler, and all solid waste deposited at facilities owned or operated by the County shall be subject to inspection without notice by the County or its agents, for purposes of ensuring compliance with this ordinance and for the purposes of data collection. Failure to allow inspection shall be a violation of this Local Law.

C. All Licensees shall be required to retain records providing backup data for the reporting requirements set forth herein and those records subject to inspection/audit for a minimum of three (3) years and/or until audited by a representative of the County.

#### SECTION 10. Penalties and Enforcement.

A. Any person found guilty by a court of competent jurisdiction of engaging in or conducting a hauling business without a duly-issued license, or any Licensee found guilty by a court of violating any term of the terms and conditions of its license, or violation of any provision of this Local Law shall be guilty of an offense punishable by a fine not exceeding Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) per offense and/or by imprisonment not exceeding six (6) months or both. Each week of a continuing violation shall constitute a separate offense or violation and shall be subject to a separate fine and/or civil penalty.

B. In addition to any other penalties prescribed in this Section, the County Attorney may maintain an action in a court of competent jurisdiction to compel compliance with or restrain by injunction any violations of the provisions of this Local Law and request a civil penalty not exceeding Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000).

C. Haulers licensed pursuant to this law will be notified, in writing, of any perceived violations of this law. They will have ten (10) business days from receipt of the Notice of Violation to remedy the violation or make contact with the Superintendent to make plans for modification. Failure to remedy the violation or make plans to remedy the violation will result in the actions as set forth in paragraphs A and B.

## SECTION 11. Confidentiality.

A. Public access to government records is mandated by the New York State Freedom of Information Law (FOIL), Public Officers Law, Article 6, Section 84-90. It is recognized that information contained in license applications and the quarterly or annual reports required hereunder may include technical, financial, or other information which a license Applicant, or Licensee believes is not required to be disclosed under FOIL.

B. Applicants or Licensees who believe that any information contained in license or registration applications, quarterly or annual reports, or any other information required to be provided by the Superintendent is not required to be disclosed under FOIL shall underline all such information in red ink and shall provide a separate written explanation of the grounds for their belief, which clearly identifies each underlined section of the application or report to which such explanation applies. Neither the Superintendent nor Washington County shall have any liability for disclosure of information that is not properly identified in the manner required by this subsection.

C. In the event that a third party requests information that has been identified and underlined as set forth in subparagraph B, above, the Applicant or Licensee shall be advised of such request. The Applicant or Licensee shall then have an opportunity to fight the FOIL request on their own behalf.

D. Nothing herein shall be construed as imposing any liability upon the Superintendent or upon Washington County where disclosure has been made in good faith pursuant to a reasonable interpretation of applicable law, or where disclosure was mandated by the order or judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction or the order of any government agency or authority having lawful jurisdiction.

## SECTION 12. Severability.

If any provision of this Chapter or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Chapter which can be given effect without regard to the invalid provision or application and to this end provisions of this law are declared to be severable.

## SECTION 13. Implementation for Existing Haulers

A. Within thirty (30) days after the Effective Date of enactment of this Local Law, the Superintendent shall publish notice at least once in the official newspaper designated by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to County Law Section 214, and thereby notify all persons who conduct, or intend to conduct, activities which shall require Licensee under this Local Law that they must submit an application for Licensee on or before January 1, 2010, or be subject to fines and/or civil penalties of up to Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) per day for conducting unlicensed activities thereafter. The public notice shall notify those persons performing activities or intending to perform activities in Washington County which

require a license pursuant to this Local Law that a license is required, and that all such persons must apply for a such license on or before January 1, 2010 in accordance with the provisions of this Local Law. The public notice shall also state all application and other fees which shall be due and payable in connection with the submission of such application.

B. By January 1, 2010, all persons who engage in or conduct a hauling business in the County must submit an application for license to the Superintendent and provide all of the information required of Applicants under this Local Law, in order to be considered for issuance of a license. With regard to applications submitted to the Superintendent during the period beginning on the Effective Date of this Local Law and ending on January 1, 2010, the Superintendent shall issue its final determination as to each such application no later than March 31, 2010.

C. With respect to those persons who submitted a timely application for a license, and have paid the required fee, as determined by the Superintendent, the Superintendent shall issue such persona temporary license, which temporary license shall be valid beginning on the date of issuance and until either (i) ninety (90) days after such application has been denied or (ii) until a license has been issued pursuant to the provisions of this Local Law, whichever occurs sooner. Notwithstanding the above, all temporary licenses issued pursuant to this subsection shall terminate on or before March 31, 2010.

D. With respect to haulers, licenses issued pursuant to this Local Law shall be valid as of the date of issue.

SECTION 14. Exceptions.

This law shall not regulate those haulers of waste water within the County.

SECTION 15. Effective Date. This Local Law shall take effect immediately and upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

**A LOCAL LAW TO SUPERSEDE THE PROVISIONS OF SUBDIVISION 6 OF SECTION 215 OF THE COUNTY LAW IN ITS APPLICATION TO CERTAIN COUNTY OWNED REAL PROPERTY AND TRANSFER STATIONS IN THE TOWNS OF GRANVILLE, GREENWICH, KINGSBURY, JACKSON AND WHITEHALL**

**BE IT ENACTED**, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Washington, New York, as follows:

**SECTION 1. County Law Section 215(6) Superceded**

Notwithstanding the provisions of Subdivision 6 of Section 215 of the County Law, all or a portion of real property owned by the County of Washington in the following locations may be sold, or leased from time to time, to private persons, corporations, non-profit corporations or any other legal entity without complying with the advertising or bidding requirements of Subdivision 6 of County Law Section 215 and upon such terms and conditions and in such manner as may be determined by resolution of the Board of Supervisors of Washington County:

- a) The **Granville** transfer station located at 8536 State Route 22 in the Town of Granville (Tax Map Parcel # 126-1-31.1);
- b) The **Greenwich** transfer station located at 291 Fiddlers Elbow Road in the Town of Greenwich (Tax Map Parcel #220.2-30.1);
- c) A 9.47 acre parcel and the transfer station building located thereon of the **Jackson** transfer station located at 408 Content Farm Road in the Town of Jackson (Tax Map Parcel # 248-1-26);
- d) The **Kingsbury** transfer station located at 1612 State Route 196 in the Town of Kingsbury (Tax Map Parcel # 155-2-10.1).
- e) A 3.79 acre parcel and the transfer station building located thereon of the **Whitehall** transfer station located at 12296 State Route 22 in the Town of Whitehall (Tax Map Parcel # 50-1-3).

***Section 2 . Effective Date.***

This local law shall take effect 45 days after its adoption, or upon the approval by a majority of the qualified electors of the County at a general election to be held in not less than 60 days after the filing of a petition protesting the adoption hereof if such petition be filed

according to law within the statutory period.

***Section 3. Separability.***

If any provision of this local law or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held invalid, the remainder of this local law and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.


